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COMPLETE PLAY IS PRODUCED BY PUPILS OF A CALGARY SCHOOL

New King Edward Building Opened Last Night and Scholars Surpass Themselves as Amateur Actors and Actresses

For the first time in the history of the Calgary schools a complete play was produced by pupils of a public school in this city, and by the splendid reception given to the scholars of the new King Edward school band by the number of people that were unable even to obtain admission, it would appear that the precedent set by William Aberhart, B.A., the popular principal, will be only the beginning of many more such entertainments. Half an hour before the performance commenced the concert hall was packed to the doors and hundreds were turned away, and in order that those who were disappointed last night might be able to see the production, the principal has decided to give the performance again on Thursday evening at 8 o'clock.

Why Play Was Produced

Before the curtain rose Mr. Aberhart said there were two purposes for the producing of the play; one was to open the new school, which he thought was the best in the city (cheers), and the second purpose was to train the children in elocution. The old method was by reading, but he desired to follow the new dramatic method. He explained that the play, which was called "Princess Chrysanthemum," was set in old Japan, and that thirty-six of the pupils were taking part.

The players without exception performed their parts excellently, and it would be difficult to give special praise to any one performer, but special mention should be made of Matthew Brown, who acted the part of Top Knot, the court chamberlain, very well and received an outburst of applause

by his clever acting. Francis Dunkley, as Prince So Sly, brought down the house with his laughing song, and proved that he can sing as well as he can act.

Youthful Thespian

He is only thirteen years of age, and acted his part excellently. Clarence Living, as the Emperor What-for-Why, also deserves great praise for his portrayal of the part of a magnanimous emperor who cut off the heads of his loyal subjects when he could not fill his coffers with sufficient gold. By his portrayal of the part and his serious expression he proved a real live emperor of the Land of the Rising Sun. He had the chief part to play, and played it well. H. C. Flood, as the Cat, was in his element, and kept the audience in roars of laughter by his amusing antics. Leo Fuson, as Prince So True; Margaret Craig, as Princess Chrysanthemum; Helen Richmond as Fairy Moonbeam, and Edna Macdonald as the empress of Japan, all acted their parts well.
